

### **Library Operations Update**

The Library will open for in-person appointments beginning May 31st. Please contact us in advance to set up an appointment. Appointments will be limited to 30 minutes. We will follow all current health related protocols to ensure the safety of staff and patrons. If you wish to pick up materials, you may call in an order and it will be available for pick up on the table outside the library's double wooden doors. Please allow us 15 minutes to prepare your order.

### **Duplication on Demand Service**

We are migrating patrons that currently receive audio books to the duplication on demand service. This service provides multiple books on a single cartridge. With this system, there is no more waiting for a book to be available. We will send you the same number of books you are used to receiving on fewer cartridges. It is possible to tailor each cartridge to your reading tastes, by including favorite authors, subject genres, series, or a mix of everything you enjoy. Each cartridge contains audio instructions about how to move from book to book, and the mailing card lists the titles on the cartridge. Address labels are adhered to the cartridges and containers now, so the mailing card can be discarded prior to returning the books. Please contact the library if you have any questions or need assistance.

### **Updating Contact Information**

If you have moved since becoming a library patron, please contact us with your new address. This includes apartment, unit or room number changes. Occasionally mail is returned from the post office and we will contact you to verify that we have your correct mailing address. If you are unsure whether we have your current information, please call us to verify.

## **Change in Certification Requirements for Print Disabilities**

The National Library Service has expanded the list of certifying authorities that are able to sign the library service application for people with print disabilities. A school psychologist, educator, social worker, counselor, rehabilitation teacher, and case worker can now certify a print disability. Please contact us with any questions.

## **New Book Collection**

We are thrilled to offer a new collection of children's books with tactile elements and transparent braille overlay. Our aim is to promote familiarity with braille at an early age to encourage interest from our youngest readers. Please spread the word, and contact us for more information.

## **BARD Account Inactivation**


If you do not log into your BARD account for 30 days or more it is suspended by NLS for security purposes. Download a book from the BARD website or the BARD app every month to prevent inactivation. If you are locked out of your BARD account, please contact us to reactivate it for you. You must download using the reactivated account within 24 hours or it will be inactivated again.

## **Mail Delivery Delays**

The U.S. Postal Service is experiencing significant delays with mail delivery nationwide. Please allow extra time for mail to arrive before calling if you have not received your order. Once the materials leave the library, we have no way to trace or locate the items in the postal system. With this noted, the duplication on demand service puts fewer items into the postal system, and we are hopeful that books will arrive to you much quicker. Downloading books via BARD is also an option, if you have a computer, smart phone, or tablet.

## Book Discussion

We are doing something a bit different this summer, and are inviting you to be a part of a statewide book discussion initiative that invites all Utahns to read a common book and then get together virtually to enjoy, reflect, and discuss. The book discussion program is called One Book, One Utah. One Book, One Utah will use Zoom as the virtual discussion platform.


The first book is called **Virga & Bone: essays from dry places by Craig Childs**. A synopsis of the book is: A deeply felt essay collection focusing on a vivid series of desert icons, including a sheet of virga over Monument Valley, white seashells in a dry desert, and boulders impossibly balanced. The author delves into the starkest landscapes and profound nature of the desert. Digital book **DBU05031**, and braille **BRU7625**.

There will be a free, virtual evening with the author, held Thursday, May 27, 2021 from 7:00-8:00 pm, MDT. A second statewide book discussion will take place in August. The book that will be discussed is Summerlost by Utah author Ally Condy. A synopsis of this book is: Following the sudden deaths of her father and her autistic younger brother, Ben, Cedar and her remaining family return to Iron Creek. Cedar spends the summer working at a Shakespearean theater festival, makes a new friend, and comes to terms with her grief. Digital book **DB084026**

Murder most strange. What's this, death by toaster?? We have books about mysterious deaths caused by ordinary things. Check out our reading list!

### **Evans to Betsy by Rhys Bowen—DB055367**

Psychic powers and a new age center. Someone is killed in a locked steam room turned on to maximum. Sixth in the Constable Evans mystery series.

### **Savage run by C. J. Box—DB055849, BR021979**

Death by exploding cow? Joe Pickett, a Wyoming game warden discovers a plan by local ranchers to assassinate high profile environmentalists using bizarre methods. Second in the Joe Pickett series. (Violence)

### **Roald Dahl's Tales of the Unexpected by Roald Dahl—DB033207**

Roald Dahl offers 24 wonderful stories that are tantalizing, comically terrifying, and grotesque. How does the wife get away with murder? By feeding the murder weapon to police, of course! (Some strong language)

### **A Fatal Grace by Louise Penny—DB067293, BR020546, LP023478**


Oh Canada! An electric heater becomes a murder weapon during a curling match. Inspector Gamache of the Surete du Quebec investigates the suspicious death. Read and find out who died and why! Second book in the Chief Inspector Gamache series. (Some strong language)

### **The Name of the Rose by Umberto Eco—DB19739**

In the year 1327, Brother William is sent to investigate heresy in a Franciscan abbey. Bizarre deaths occur soon after his arrival, spurring Brother William to turn detective. Along with the novice Adso, he relies on the logic of Aristotle and the theory of Aquinas to discover a murderer and how a book can kill...

### **Seventy-seven Clocks by Christopher Fowler—DB97172**

Detectives May and Bryant work in the Peculiar Crimes Unit, and the slew of murders they investigate in London involve death by exploding clock, toxic makeup, and a venomous snake bite. Third book in the Bryant & May series. (Violence and some descriptions of sex)
